Energy Issues Summit, Northern Solar and school safety

Your board of directors and I recently attended the Minnesota Rural Electric Association's (MREA) Energy Issues Summit. This annual event takes a deep dive into energy issues in the state of Minnesota and nationally and serves as a provocative and engaging platform.

Many topics were covered at the summit and I'd like to share a few of those with our members. We heard from Sen. David Osmeck and Rep. Marion O'Neill regarding the state of energy in Minnesota. Sen. Osmeck, Chair of the Energy and Utilities Finance and Policy Committee, opined that Minnesota needs a true, all-of-the-above energy policy for baseload generation that includes coal, natural gas and nuclear. He also indicated renewable energy is an important part of the mix, including hydro, solar and wind. Rep. O'Neill, Assistant Majority Leader, stressed the importance of taking a practical and cost-effective approach to meeting our energy needs and discussed opportunities to improve the Conservation Improvement Program and the Public Utilities Commission appointment process. Both legislators articulated the importance of a true, market-based approach to generation resources as opposed to government subsidies.

Also discussed at the conference was an item I've discussed here and at our annual meeting last spring. And that is the concept of Beneficial Electrification. While we have always tried to help our members use energy more efficiently, that does not mean that we must stop selling kilowatt-hours. The term Beneficial Electrification is rooted in the notion that our membership, and society, can benefit from using electricity. For example, electrifying our transportation sector using Electric Vehicles (EVs) increases electricity sales while reducing carbon emissions. As the electric grid becomes greener, EVs can increase kilowatt-hour sales and provide a societal benefit by reducing tailpipe emissions.

Another example can be found in

water heating and space heating. For years we have witnessed the development of intermittent renewable resources, and in our wholesale power provider's case, those resources are predominantly wind. We have learned wind blows the strongest at night when average electric loads are lowest. This lends itself well to integration with our existing storage water and storage space heating programs that charge during the overnight hours. In addition, highly efficient heating and cooling systems such as air-source heat pumps and ground-source heat pumps can provide tremendous benefit to our members and to society over their fossil fuel counterparts.


We also learned of innovative demand response, solar and EV programs currently being offered by cooperatives around the country. This collaboration among cooperatives is one of the very best features of the rural electric program, and we are better for it.

Northern Solar

At the time of this writing, construction of our community solar project was nearly complete and we will soon be going through the commissioning process. The 80-kilowatt (kW) array is located in front of our headquarters facility and is scheduled to come online in August.

School safety

It's hard to believe it's that time of year again. Where did the summer go? As kids head back to school this month, please keep safety at the top of your mind. Our youngsters are precious and while your cooperative frequently talks about electrical safety, it's important we not stop there. Please be aware of your surroundings when driving. “No Barriers” Program for Service-Disabled Veterans

Beltrami Electric member William Benso selected for the CoBank “No Barriers” program

CoBank, a cooperative bank serving agribusinesses, rural infrastructure providers and Farm Credit associations through the United States, launched a new program this year for veterans from America’s rural communities with disabilities. Cooperatives and other eligible CoBank borrowers were able to nominate veterans from their local communities to participate in the No Barriers Warriors program, with CoBank covering the full cost for each veteran, including travel expenses.

“Every American owes an enormous debt of gratitude to the men and women who serve in the Armed Forces and protect our country,” said Bob Engel, CoBank’s chief executive officer. “Those who are wounded or injured in the course of duty are even more deserving of our thanks. At CoBank, we want to do our part to honor veterans and repay them for their service to the nation.”



Beltrami Electric Cooperative board member Sue Kringen was instantly excited about this program when she heard about it. She quickly reached out to the local Disabled Veterans Services group to see if there was a veteran who would be interested in the opportunity. She was able to nominate a cooperative member and veteran William (Billy) Benso and was delighted to hear that he was selected to participate in the program.

Billy is a veteran of the Marine Corps. While in the Marine Corps, he spent time in Bosnia, Kosovo and helped out in South Africa after the U.S. Embassy bombings. After his service in the Marines, he began to search for his purpose, pride and service. He decided to go to school and become a registered nurse and later received his Bachelor’s Degree in nursing. He lives in Bemidji with his wife, Alissa, also a nurse, and his two daughters, Kylee and Amelia.

Billy participated in the No Barriers Warriors expedition in July. The expedition, which included hiking, rock climbing and white-water rafting, was designed to push veterans mentally and

physically in some of nature’s most incredible wilderness settings. No Barriers allows for veterans to reflect on their past, recognize where they are in the present and then look with positivity to the future. They do so in a spirit of camaraderie; where veterans with a shared background come together to encourage and inspire each other. The No Barriers experience serves as both an opportunity for growth and a catalyst for change as the veterans stretch their boundaries, innovate through adversity and step up to serve others.

“This experience really helped to reaffirm my belief that I can keep moving forward,” said Billy. “It was an important reminder that as veterans, we have to take time to take care of ourselves. It’s easy to forget that. I’m very fortunate to have a great support system in my family.”

Billy actively advocates for veterans and organized a veterans’ support group. He is a member of the Disabled American Veterans and the American Legion. He has also

worked to organize the 22-A-Day March around Lake Bemidji, that will be held on Saturday, Sept. 9, 2017, at 7 a.m. to bring awareness to the 22 veterans a day who are lost to suicide.

“The No Barriers Warriors’ expedition is a great program for veterans and I hope it continues,” said Billy.

“There are many service-disabled veterans who could benefit from this experience.

I’m very thankful that Beltrami Electric Cooperative took an interest in this program and nominated me to participate.”



Beltrami Electric's 2017 Power Plant Tour took place July 18-20. Our group met at BEC to board the charter bus and departed promptly at 6:30 a.m. The first stop of the tour was at Minnkota Power Cooperative in Grand Forks, N.D., where Minnkota CEO Mac McLennan spoke to our group and answered questions. We then had the opportunity to tour Minnkota's control center and print shop.

The afternoon featured a stop in Casselton, N.D., for lunch and an opportunity to stretch our legs. We then continued west to Valley City, N.D., where Minnkota area line worker Mark Hoar met us at Minnkota Power Cooperative's Infinity Wind tower. With the wind tower being down for maintenance that day, it gave us the opportunity to go inside the base of the turbine. We arrived at our hotel in Mandan, N.D., that evening and concluded the first day with a banquet dinner and presentation by Minnkota employee Mary Schneider from the Milton R. Young Station.

Day 2 began early as well, with our group heading to the Milton R. Young Station at 7 a.m. Thunderstorms rolled through that morning, providing some much-needed rain to the drought stricken area. Unfortunately, the rain prevented our group from being able to visit the BNI coal mine to see the Liberty dragline up close. If only I could control the weather! After lunch we headed to the Lewis & Clark Interpretive Center and Fort Mandan. We were able to tour the many exhibits at both locations as well as listen to a presentation on how fly ash from an area coal mine was used in construction of the Fort Mandan





REPORTING POWER OUTAGES



You are at home going about your normal routine, and suddenly, your power goes off. Now what? Here are some tips on what to check before you call us, to be sure you have an outage and the problem isn't on your side of the meter.

1. Check your breakers or fuses.
2. Check with your neighbors to see if they are also out of power.
3. Then call and provide any other information that may help us locate the cause of the outage, such as a downed tree, lightning strike, branch across a wire, etc.

How our outage system works

A power outage reported to BEC is automatically matched to our computer database using the phone number you call from. If you're not calling from the phone number in our system, you can enter the number tied to your BEC account or you can enter your BEC account number and still be automatically matched.

The location of the outage then lights up on a map. This is why it is beneficial to have on file the phone number you are most likely to call from when reporting a power outage.

If we do not have your phone number, the outage line will tell you that your call does not match our records. Please know that these calls are still processed – it is just done manually, which may slow the process and our response

time. We can store up to three numbers in our system, if you have a seasonal number or cellphone, please let us know. The current number we have on file is located on your monthly billing statement; please verify that that number is correct.

Beltrami Electric Cooperative (BEC) does everything possible to keep the lights on and to restore service as soon as possible. By being prepared and informed, you can assist us in restoring power in the timeliest manner possible. BEC crews work hard to restore outages as quickly and safely as possible. We appreciate your cooperation and patience during these times.

Beltrami Electric's board of directors conducted its regular monthly meeting Wednesday, July 26, 2017. A quorum of directors was present.

The following reports were given:

- CEO Echnernach presented a resolution adopting the Authority of the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission in Minnesota Statute Section 216b.164, and the Cogeneration Rules Implementing 216b.164. He also presented revisions to the Distributed Generation/Net-Metering policy.
- CEO Echnernach made his monthly report, including discussion on the June financials and updates on the new meter system and Northern Solar. He also discussed the Operation Round Up program and legislative issues affecting the electric industry.
- Sid Stletten gave the Financial and Statistical report for June, including review of work orders. He also reviewed the second quarter budget and the draft 2016 Form 990.
- Rich Riewer presented the updated 2017-2020 construction work plan.
- Directors shared highlights of meetings attended on behalf of the cooperative and discussed upcoming meetings and educational conferences.

The following actions were taken:

- Approved the consent agenda and work order inventories.
- Adopted a resolution adopting the authority of the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission in Minnesota Statute Section 216b.164, and Cogeneration Rules Implementing 216b.164.
- Approved updated 2017-2020 construction work plan.
- Approved revisions to BEC policies 308 and 103.
- Approved moving the August board meeting to Aug. 29, 2017.
- Appointed Jared Echnernach as the CoBank voting delegate.

The next regular board meeting will be Wednesday, Sept. 27, 2017.

SYSTEMWIDE METER UPGRADE – installing new meters to help serve you better

Work continues on our systemwide meter upgrade and to date **we have installed more than 14,000 new meters**. Our existing metering system was installed in the mid-1990s and has reached its end-of-life, and the manufacturer is no longer supporting this older equipment.



In April, BEC contracted with a third party metering group, Allegiant Utility Services, to assist in completing the remaining meter exchanges. Allegiant Utility Services' vehicles have its logo, as well as signage designating that they are a contractor for Beltrami Electric. The contractors from Allegiant

Utility Services also wear an ID badge with their name and photo.

The new meters will improve reliability and give you more tools and opportunities to manage and save energy. The impact of the installation is minimal. Co-op members can expect to lose power for a few minutes on the day of installation. You may need to reset your electronic devices, such as digital clocks. In addition, the next bill will show two meter readings: one from the old meter and one from the new meter. We will not need to access your home or business, nor will you need to be on-site when this work is performed.
