While investor-owned utilities return profits to investors and stockholders, Beltrami Electric Cooperative is a member-owned, not-for-profit cooperative, and we allocate excess revenue to members as "capital credits," and retire – or pay – them when the co-op's financial condition permits.

It PAYS to be a member-owner of Beltrami Electric! Earning and receiving capital credits is just one of the benefits of membership in Beltrami Electric Cooperative, Inc. This year the board of directors for Beltrami Electric has approved the retirement and paying of nearly \$1 million in capital credits for more than 20,000 present and former members of Beltrami Electric!

How do capital credits work?

MEMBER PATRONAGE

Beltrami Electric keeps track of how much electricity you purchase throughout the year.

ALLOCATION

After a year ends, Beltrami Electric distributes your share of the margins for that year to your capital credit account. This normally happens in March for the previous year. Allocated capital credits are not payable at the time they are distributed.

(Margins = REVENUE - EXPENSES)

ALLOCATED CAPITAL CREDITS


Capital credits increase on your account over a period of time. Beltrami Electric uses the allocated capital credits as a source of equity to build and maintain its electrical system, which in turn helps keep power costs low.



RETIREMENT OF CAPITAL **CREDITS**

Once a year, depending on the financial

condition of Beltrami Electric, the board of directors will decide to retire and pay capital credits to present and former





A Benefit of Co-op Membership

When you signed up service from Beltrami Electric, you became a member of an electric cooperative. Electric cooperatives allocate revenue to members as "capital credits," and retire or pay - them when the co-op's financial



Present members who receive a capital credit retirement will see a credit on their statement in late November or early December (depending on the billing cycle). A credit applied to a statement will be listed as "Apply Capital Credit Retirement" under the Detail of Charges.

Capital credits, 2018 outlook

Members to receive nearly \$1 million in capital credits

I am pleased to report that your board of directors has authorized a capital credit retirement of nearly \$1 million in 2017. Credits will appear on the bills members receive in December. Checks to former members are scheduled to be mailed in mid-December just in time for the holiday season.

Each year since 1984 your board of directors has authorized a retirement of capital credits to the members. This year your board of directors once again authorized a hybrid method, retiring 50 percent of the co-op allocation from 1993 to wholesale accounts, 50 percent of the co-op allocation from 1994 excluding wholesale accounts and 2 percent of the co-op allocation from all remaining unretired years. Under the hybrid method of retirement, more members and newer members will benefit from the capital credit retirement and experience the cooperative difference.

As a member of Beltrami Electric Cooperative, you are also an owner. Any margins realized at the end of the year are allocated to the members based on the amount of electricity used. We credit this amount on an annual basis to a patronage allocation account in your name. This allocation is held by the cooperative as equity, which allows us to reduce borrowing costs while maintaining your distribution plant. You can be proud of the fact that more than \$23.9 million has been returned to members in the history of the cooperative.

2018 outlook

Your board of directors is in the process of reviewing the 2018 preliminary budget and rates. We expect wholesale power costs to remain relatively flat in 2018. This is welcome news as wholesale power makes up 70 percent of our total costs. We will continue to work hard internally to minimize the impact of any increase in 2018, but at this point it appears a modest increase may be necessary.

Cooperative rates are intended to be fair across all rate classes and your board of directors works diligently under a rate policy designed to ensure fair rates. As a not-for-profit, member-owned cooperative, the only time we increase rates is when we absolutely must to satisfy our loan covenants and to keep your cooperative financially stable. We will communicate any changes in advance so members have time to prepare and budget. In addition, we will continue to promote ways members can save on their energy bill through our conservation and efficiency programs.

Metering project

Your cooperative's meter replacement program continues ahead of schedule. Allegiant Utility Services has been installing new meters throughout our service area over the past year. With more than 50 percent of the new meters installed, we expect this project to be completed by the end of 2018. Our existing meters have reached their end-life, and since the meter serves as the cash register for each of our services, it's an important and necessary project. When our contractor changes the

meter at your service location, it should only take a few minutes. Power will be disrupted during this time and we thank you for your patience as we complete this project.

The good news is that the new meters will provide additional benefits to our members, including more detailed information on electric use, so those looking to improve conservation and efficiency will have access to more information on when they consume electricity. You can access this information through your cooperative's website using programs such as MyMeter and SmartHub.

We are already experiencing benefits of the new metering system in terms of troubleshooting. In several cases the meter data has allowed us to work with members to diagnose a problem on their side of the service, eliminating the need to send a crew.

In the case of a line outage where several members are without power, the meters can remotely verify that power has successfully been restored, providing more accurate information to our line crews and to our members, thus reducing the potential for crews to be called back later.

We will continue to evaluate ways the new meter system can enhance the value of your membership.

SMART TIPS FOR USING SPACE HEATERS/ELECTRIC BLANKETS



Many people turn to space heaters or electric blankets for added warmth in the winter. Safe Electricity reminds those who use space heaters and electric blankets to keep safety considerations in mind and use these devices with caution.

When buying a space heater or electric blanket, check for approved safety certification

marks to verify that the product has been tested for safety. Look for space heaters and electric blankets with safety features, including an automatic shut off. Be very cautious about buying used space heaters or electric blankets. They may not have up-to-date safety mechanisms. Your safety is worth the investment in a new heater or blanket.

Safe Electricity shares the following tips for using space heaters and electric blankets:

- Review and follow all manufacturer directions.
- Plug space heaters and electric blankets directly into outlets; avoid using an extension cord.
- Always remember to turn off space heaters and electric blankets when not in use. Never leave one of these devices on unattended or after going to bed.
- Many fires start when flammable products are placed too close to heating devices, such as space heaters. Space heaters should be kept at least 3 feet from blankets, clothing, paper and other flammables.
- Place space heaters out of high-traffic areas and on a level, hard, nonflammable floor surface – NOT on carpets, furniture or countertops.
- Be aware of pets and children near heating appliances. Pets should never be allowed to sleep on top of electric blankets.
- Keep space heaters and electric blankets away from water. If they become wet, do not turn them on to dry.
- Regularly examine cords to make sure there is no cracking or fraying. Do not use damaged appliances. Also inspect your electric blanket to ensure that it is not worn or damaged. It should not have any charred or dark areas. Replace old or damaged blankets.
- Store your electric blanket in a manner which avoids creasing. If it cannot be stored flat, loosely fold or roll the blanket in a cool, dry closet.

Tips for staying safe this holiday season



Gathering with family and friends during the holidays often means making great memories, reliving traditions and sharing the spirit of the season. However, amid all the festivities, don't forget about safety. Safe Electricity shares tips to help ensure that your holiday season – whether decorating, feasting or traveling – remains a safe one.

Keep safety in mind when decorating the home. Ensure that your tree is placed at least 3 feet away from heat sources such as fireplaces or radiators and on a stable platform. Before hanging holiday lights, check for worn spots, fraying and excessive kinking. Damaged strands of lights should not be used. Consider investing in LED light strands. Although they are more expensive than traditional incandescent bulbs, LED lights last much longer and are also more efficient and durable.

Don't get burned in the kitchen. Clean your stovetop and oven often, especially before the large amount of baking and cooking that takes place for family gatherings. Doing so will help prevent fires in the kitchen, should a malfunction or accident in the kitchen take place. Do not leave combustible items, such as towels or potholders, near the stovetop. Keep all appliance cords away from heat. Never use appliances near the kitchen sink. Plug appliances into ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) outlets. Unplug your appliances when they are not in use.

Whether you are leaving the home for a few hours or for a few weeks, turn off all lights when they are not in use. Your neighbors can still enjoy your exterior Christmas lights while you are away if you put them on an automatic timer. This will remove the extra worry of an electrical accident while also reducing energy costs. If you will be gone for an extended holiday trip, you can reduce the risk of a power surge damaging equipment by unplugging unneeded electrical devices before leaving.

Quick Tips to Avoid High Winter Bills

Looking to lower your bills this winter? Use the 10 tips below to conserve energy.



Seal air leaks and insulate well to prevent heat from escaping and cold air from entering your home.



Reduce waste heat by installing a programmable thermostat.



Turn off lights when not in use.



Lower your water heater temperature. The Dept. of Energy recommends using the warm setting (120 degrees) during fall and winter months.



Unplug electronics like kitchen appliances and TVs when you're away.



Open blinds and curtains during the day to allow sunlight in to warm your home.



Close blinds and curtains at night to keep cold, drafty air out.



Use power strips for multiple appliances, and turn off the main switch when you're away from home.



Wash clothes in cold water, and use cold-water detergent whenever possible.



Replace incandescent light bulbs with LEDs, which use at least 75 percent less energy.

Board Meeting **Highlights**

Beltrami Electric's board of directors conducted its regular monthly meeting Wednesday, Oct. 25, 2017. A quorum of directors was present.

The following reports were given:

- CEO Echternach presented Charlie Parson and Sue Kringen each with their Credentialed Cooperative Director Program certificate.
- CEO Echternach gave his monthly report, including discussion on the new meter system, legislative issues, Operation Round Up, area solar projects and recent meetings attended. He also presented a draft political action plan.
- Credit Manager Dan Dow and Member Service Manager Jolene Kallroos reviewed the Cold Weather Rule and collections process.
- Attorney Gerad Paul reviewed recommended updates to the Bylaws suggested by the Bylaw Review
- Sid Sletten gave the Financial and Statistical report for September including review of work orders. He also presented Resolutions approving the Long-Range Load Forecast, a new FFB loan and increased borrowing
- CEO Echternach presented proposed 2017 general capital credit retirement.
- President Coe appointed Judy Honer as the MREA voting delegate and Craig Gaasvig as the alternate
- Directors shared highlights of meetings attended on behalf of the cooperative and discussed upcoming meetings and educational conferences.

The following actions were taken:

- Approved the consent agenda and work order inventories.
- Approved the Long-Range Load Forecast.
- Approved the 2017 general capital credit retirement.
- Approved the increased borrowing limits and FFB loan.

The next regular board meeting will be Wednesday, Dec. 27, 2017.
