


Tuesday - Thursday, July 24-26, 2018

Summer safety

School is out, or soon will be, summer is approaching and many families are preparing their summer vacations. Summer brings a lot of activity to our service area, and I'd like to remind our members of the importance of safety and to slow down, look up and be aware of your surroundings.

Safety is a universal word that is mentioned often and used loosely. Communities large and small, as well as companies across all industries, are committed to safety. Unfortunately, when it really counts, steps to keep the public, employees and loved ones safe are often ignored in the interest of expediency or convenience.

However, safety is a serious issue, especially when it comes to electrical safety. For your cooperative, it's the number one priority. This is not empty talk. Over many years, Beltrami Electric has created a culture of safety by putting our employees' safety and that of the community above all else. At its essence, your cooperative's mission is to provide safe, reliable electricity to its member-owners. At the end of the day, we strive to deliver affordable and reliable electricity to our member-owners, but equally important, we want our employees to return home safely to their loved ones. This requires ongoing focus, dedication and vigilance.

Improving our safety culture

One of your cooperative's strategic initiatives is to continue to improve our safety culture. Our safety team's primary focus is keeping employees and the community safe around electricity. We established and follow safety protocols based on leading national safety practices for the utility industry. We require our employees to wear specialized equipment when working next to or with power lines. There are specific protocols our employees follow when dealing with electricity. Our safety team has regular meetings during which they discuss practices and procedures from a safety perspective. They monitor and track near-misses in order to understand them. share lessons learned and improve in the future.

Just as important, we encourage all of

our crews to speak up and hold each other accountable for safety. By cultivating a culture of openness and transparency, we promote problem-solving with regard to safety. We examine historical data to discern patterns and use safety metrics to improve in those areas where we have fallen short.

Keeping our communities safe

Because we live and work in the community we serve, we care about our neighbors. Your cooperative conducts numerous electrical safety demonstrations in schools and at community events. If you would like us to provide a safety demonstration at your school or community event, please contact us.

According to the Electrical Safety Foundation, each year thousands of people in the United States are critically injured and electrocuted as a result of electrical fires, accidents and electrocution in their own homes. Many of these accidents are preventable. There is much you can do to keep yourself and your community safe around electricity.

Don't attempt electrical DIY projects for which you are not trained or comfortable performing. Report downed power lines or electric equipment that looks amiss. Be mindful when it comes to electrical safety. Please slow down and enjoy the summer and take the extra time to plug into safety.

Each year following the annual meeting, your board of directors holds its organizational meeting. 

- Arlene Hogquist gave the financial report and reviewed the firstquarter budget performance and the first-quarter Balanced Performance Scorecard.
- Sam Mason reported on the annual meeting held April 19, 2018, and gave an update on Northern Solar.
- CEO Echternach discussed a donation to the Cooperative System Integrity Fund from Cooperative Finance Corporation and the various uses for the funds.
- Directors and the CEO shared highlights of meetings attended on behalf of the cooperative and discussed upcoming meetings and educational conferences.

In the utility business, we know rough weather will occur, and sometimes power outages simply can't be avoided. But did you know there are steps you can take to ensure your electricity is restored as quickly and safely as possible? By keeping your contact information up to date, you can take full advantage of the services Beltrami Electric Cooperative offers.

You may have noticed prompts through our newsletter and social media pages requesting your updated contact information. If we don't have the correct phone number linked to your home address, it makes it much more difficult for you to report an outage, or for the co-op to notify you when possible of a pre-arranged outage.

Remember when you had to speak to a member service representative in order to report a power outage? Waiting on hold could be frustrating and time consuming. Today, with the press of a button, you can easily report an outage. At Beltrami Electric, we use the phone number you provide to link your service address to our outage management system. For example, if you call us to report an outage, our automated system instantly recognizes your phone number and can determine the particular service address from which you are reporting an outage. Once you give our system a response, your outage is reported. It's that simple! But remember – this only works if your current phone number is linked to your service address.

Updating your contact information is helpful because it also speeds up the power restoration process. With correct information, our outage management system can predict the location and the possible cause of an outage, making it easier for our crews to correct the problem.
